Prof Samar Aoun, Professor of Palliative Care Research, Perron Institute and La Trobe University

Samar adopts a public health approach to models of care and advocates for person-centred health and social care. Her research programs on supporting family caregivers at end of life and the public health approach to bereavement care have informed policy and practice at the national and international levels. She co-founded the South West Compassionate Communities Network in 2018, is the current chair and is leading the Compassionate Connector Project in partnership with the WA Country Health Service. In 2018 Samar received the medal for excellence from the European Society for Person Centred Healthcare.



Adrian Barrett, Funeral Director, William Barrett & Sons

Adrian is a fourth-generation funeral director in his family business and the President of the Australian Funeral Directors Association. With more than 20 years' experience in the funeral industry, Adrian is passionate about grief education and ensuring the families he serves have access to, and knowledge of, support systems in the community. Adrian and his wife, Taryn, are active members of the South West Compassionate Communities Network and keen to support its growth in the years to come.



Rosie Brown, CEO, Busselton Hospice Care Inc.

Rosie has over 35-years' experience as a clinician, educator, manager, communicator and leader in the health industry in Australia and the UK. Whilst starting her career in Perth, Rosie moved to the UK in 2001 managing a busy outpatient department before taking up the position of Online Learning Manager at the Royal College of Nursing. Returning to WA in 2013, Rosie played a key role in the induction and orientation of staff to the new Busselton Health Campus in 2015. Rosie joined Busselton Hospice Care Inc. as the Hospice Volunteer Manager in 2017 before taking up the role of CEO in January, 2020.



Lana Glogowski, CEO, Palliative Care WA

Lana Glogowski has 30 years experience as a community service professional with management roles in Federal, State and Local Government as well as the not-for-profit sector. She has served as a local government councillor as well as on a number of Boards. For the past six years her successful consultancy business, Progressing Priority Projects, has provided project management, strategic planning and training services across WA. She is also CEO for Palliative Care WA and during her tenure has grown this peak organisation and secured State Government funding.



Dr Andrea Grindrod, Research Fellow and Projects Manager, Public Health Palliative Care, La Trobe University
Andrea is an international leader in public health approaches to palliative and end of life care. Her focus on end of life combines research and evaluation, policy and program development and a systems approach to support practice in the local government, disability and neighbourhood sectors. She is the founder and developer of the Healthy End of Life Program (HELP) which is being used to progress Public Health Palliative Care (PHPC) practice and research in Australia and internationally. HELP is featured in the World Health Organization's Global Atlas of Palliative Care. Andrea is a member of the PHPC International Council.



Prof Allan Kellehear, Clinical Professor, College of Nursing & Health Sciences, University of Vermont
Allan founded the 'new' public health movement in palliative care – variously known as 'health promoting
palliative care', or 'public health approach' to palliative care, or the 'compassionate communities' movement.
He is also Associate Director of the charity 'Compassionate Communities UK' and a Fellow of the Academy of
Social Sciences. Allan has authored 25 books in this field including Compassionate Cities: public health and end
of life care (2005), The Inner Life of the Dying Person (2014), and Visitors at the End of Life: Finding meaning and
purpose in near-death phenomena (2020).



Jeremy McKnight, Co-founder Shannon's Bridge

Shannon's Bridge is a charity and volunteer run Compassionate Community organisation. Its vision is that family and friends have the knowledge and confidence to help achieve and respect people's end of life wishes. Shannon McKnight (Jeremy's daughter) was diagnosed with a rare leukaemia when she was 17 and spent the next two years in hospitals having intensive treatments. When the treatments no longer worked, Shannon wanted to be home when she died. Local communities stepped in to bridge the gap and to connect Shannon and her family with support to help make her wish of staying home to die a reality.

Nadia Mitsopoulos, Journalist, ABC Radio

Nadia is a journalist and broadcaster with almost 30 years' experience in radio and television. She hosts the Mornings program on ABC Radio. After completing a Bachelor of Arts degree, Nadia worked as a journalist at GWN and Ten Network, and then joined Associated Press in London as a Producer. On her return she became the State Political Reporter for Nine News. Nadia moved to ABC Radio in 2013, working initially as a producer before presenting the Focus and Breakfast programs. Nadia is a board member of Lifeline WA, the number one ticketholder for West Coast Fever and a passionate advocate for suicide prevention.



Leanne O'Shea, Deputy Chair of the South West Compassionate Communities Network and Director of the South West Grief and Loss Centre.

Leanne is passionate about the importance of grief literacy and awareness for building compassionate communities and finding comfort in the discomfort of death, dying, grief and loss. The Grief and Loss Centre was developed to build community connection and encourage conversations around death and dying. Leanne specialises in grief, bereavement and end of life. She works part time at Busselton Hospice Care and does contract work in the private, community and health sector.



Lesley Pearson, Regional Manager-Great Southern, WA Primary Health Alliance

Lesley has over 40 years' clinical experience within the primary health sector throughout regional, rural and remote WA..One of the most exciting achievements in Lesley's primary health career has been the allocation and co-location of staff and resources to the City of Albany for the Aged Friendly Charter and Compassionate Communities Projects. The formation of these new collaborative partnerships between the community, health services and local government has created the opportunity for a collective impact on the social determinants affecting the health and well-being of our communities.



A/Prof Bruce Rumbold, *Director of the Public Health Palliative Care Unit at La Trobe University, Melbourne* The Unit works collaboratively with health services, community groups and other academic programs in a number of community capacity building projects on end of life care. Bruce's multidisciplinary interests are supported by postgraduate qualifications in physics, practical theology and health social science. Prior to joining La Trobe University, he was foundation professor of pastoral studies at what is now the University of Divinity, Melbourne. In 2005, he was awarded an OAM for services to palliative care and pastoral care, particularly as an educator.



Shelly Skinner, CEO, Lionheart Camp for Kids

With a passion and commitment to working with children and their families following the death of a loved one, Shelly is committed to working towards building a community where grief is seen as a healthy and positive response to death and life challenges. She wants everyone to be taught the skills to grieve in a healthy and safe way. As the recipient of the 2020 John Curtin Medal, Shelly strives to raise awareness of the importance of providing children with the opportunity to speak about emotions and death and to practice these skills in preparation for life's challenges ahead.



Bonnie Tompkins, *Public Health Professional, Pallium Canada*

Bonnie's work mobilises Compassionate Communities across Canada and focuses on the community and their role in supporting those experiencing serious illness, caregiving, dying, and grieving. Bonnie has led community-level initiatives across Canada and is an active contributor to Compassionate Communities work internationally. She is a council member of the Public Health Palliative Care International Association and contributor to CancerandWork.ca. Her interest in palliative care developed through personal experiences as a caregiver to her late partner who died while completing her public health degree.



Jessie Williams, CEO Groundswell

Jessie has been with GroundSwell since 2012 in various roles and as CEO since 2019. The GroundSwell Project works in healthcare, neighbourhoods and workplaces to build compassionate communities that support people through their toughest times of health decline, ageing, dying and grief. It is a social change organisation that encourages people to talk about death and dying and care in their own way. After losing her first born son in 2006, she experienced post traumatic growth thanks to her community. She invites everyone to be a part of the collective change around death and dying in Australia.




